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8 SYNOPSIS: This bill would establish the Local Control
9 School Flexibility Act of 2013.

10 This bill would authorize the establishment
11 of innovative schools and school systems in the
12 State of Alabama.

13 This bill would allow the State Board of
14 Education to enter into a school flexibility
15 contract with a local school system to allow for
16 programmatic flexibility or budgetary flexibility,
17 or both, from state laws, including State Board of
18 Education rules, regulations, and policies in
19 exchange for academic and associated goals for
20 students that focus on college and career
21 readiness.

22 This bill would require the local board of
23 education to submit a document of assurance that
24 the local board shall provide consistency in
25 leadership and a commitment to the standards,

1 assessments, and academic rigor expected in
2 Alabama.

3 This bill would require the local school
4 system to submit a proposed innovation plan
5 recommended by the local superintendent of
6 education and approved by the local board of
7 education to the State Superintendent of Education
8 in order to qualify for innovation status.

9 This bill would also authorize the State
10 Board of Education to promulgate any necessary
11 rules and regulations as required for
12 implementation.

15 TO BE ENTITLED

18 To establish the Local Control School Flexibility
19 Act of 2013, relating to public K-12 education; to authorize
20 the establishment of innovative schools and school systems in
21 the state; to provide legislative findings and purposes; to
22 provide an overview; to authorize the State Board of Education
23 to enter into school flexibility contracts with local school
24 systems; to require the local board of education to submit a
25 document of assurance; to require the State Board of Education
26 to promulgate rules and regulations relating to innovative

1 school systems; to require local school systems to submit an
2 innovation plan to the State Department of Education in order
3 to qualify for innovation status; and to provide for an
4 effective date.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

6 Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited
7 as the Local Control School Flexibility Act of 2013.

8 Section 2. (a) Innovative schools and school systems
9 may be established in Alabama in accordance with this act.

10 (b) The purpose of this act is to advance the
11 benefits of local school and school system autonomy in
12 innovation and creativity by allowing flexibility from state
13 laws, regulations, and policies.

14 Section 3. (a) The Legislature finds and declares
15 all of the following:

16 (1) To further the goals of public education
17 throughout the state, each school system should be able to
18 have maximum possible flexibility to meet the needs of
19 students and the communities within its jurisdiction.

20 (2) There is a critical need for innovative models
21 of public education that are tailored to the unique
22 circumstances and needs of the students in all schools and
23 communities, and especially in schools and communities that
24 are struggling to improve academic outcomes and close the
25 achievement gap.

1 (3) To better serve students and better use
2 available resources, local boards of education and local
3 school systems need the ability to explore flexible
4 alternatives in an effort to be more efficient and effective
5 in providing operational and programmatic services.

6 (b) Therefore, it is the intent of the Legislature
7 to do all of the following:

8 (1) Allow school systems greater flexibility in
9 meeting the educational needs of a diverse student population.

10 (2) Improve educational performance through greater
11 individual school autonomy and managerial flexibility with
12 regard to programs and budgetary matters.

13 (3) Encourage innovation in education by providing
14 local school systems and school administrators with greater
15 control over decisions including, but not limited to,
16 budgetary matters, staffing, personnel, scheduling, and
17 educational programming, including curriculum and instruction.

18 Section 4. For the purposes of this act, the
19 following terms shall have the following meanings:

20 (1) FLEXIBILITY CONTRACT. A school flexibility
21 contract between the local school system and the State Board
22 of Education wherein a local school system may apply for
23 programmatic flexibility or budgetary flexibility, or both,
24 from state laws, regulations, and policies, including
25 regulations and policies promulgated by the State Board of
26 Education and the State Department of Education.

1 (2) INNOVATION PLAN. The request of a local school
2 system for flexibility and plan for annual accountability
3 measures and five-year targets for all participating schools
4 within the school system.

5 (3) LOCAL BOARD OF EDUCATION. A city or county board
6 of education that exercises management and control of a local
7 school system pursuant to state law.

8 (4) LOCAL SCHOOL SYSTEM. A public agency that
9 establishes and supervises one or more public schools within
10 its geographical limits pursuant to state law.

11 (5) SCHOOL ADMINISTRATOR. A local superintendent of
12 education or local school principal, unless otherwise
13 specified.

14 Section 5. (a) Pursuant to this act, to be
15 considered as an innovative school system, a local school
16 system shall successfully comply with the requirements and
17 procedures set forth by the State Department of Education
18 regarding school flexibility contracts, which include, but are
19 not limited to:

20 (1) Submission to the State Department of Education
21 of a letter of intent to pursue a school flexibility contract.

22 (2) Submission to the State Department of Education
23 of a resolution adopted by the local board of education
24 supporting the intent of the local school system to pursue a
25 school flexibility contract.

1 (3) Submission to the State Department of Education
2 of a document of assurance stating that the local board of
3 education shall provide consistency in leadership and a
4 commitment to state standards, assessments, and academic
5 rigor.

6 (4) Submission to the State Board of Education of a
7 resolution adopted by the local board of education supporting
8 the flexibility contract proposal and the anticipated timeline
9 of the local school system.

10 (b) Pursuant to State Board of Education rules, each
11 local school system shall provide an opportunity for full
12 discussion and public input before submitting a school
13 flexibility contract proposal to the State Board of Education.

14 (c) A local school system shall ensure that its
15 school flexibility contract proposal and innovation plan is
16 easily accessible to the general public on the website of the
17 local school system.

18 Section 6. (a) The innovation plan of a local school
19 system shall include, at a minimum, all of the following:

20 (1) The school year that the local school system
21 expects the school flexibility contract to begin.

22 (2) The list of state laws, regulations, and
23 policies, including rules, regulations, and policies
24 promulgated by the State Board of Education and the State
25 Department of Education, that the local school system is
26 seeking to waive in its school flexibility contract.

1 (3) A list of schools included in the innovation
2 plan of the local school system.

3 (b) A local school system is accountable to the
4 state for the performance of all schools in its system,
5 including innovative schools, under state and federal
6 accountability requirements.

7 (c) A local school system may not, pursuant to this
8 act, waive requirements imposed by federal law, requirements
9 related to the health and safety of students or employees,
10 requirements imposed by open records or open meetings laws,
11 requirements related to financial or academic reporting or
12 transparency, requirements designed to protect the civil
13 rights of students or employees, requirements related to
14 participation in a state retirement system or state health
15 insurance plan, or requirements imposed by Section 16-13-231,
16 Code of Alabama 1975. This act may not be construed to allow a
17 local school system to compensate a current employee at an
18 annual rate that is less than the amount the current employee
19 would otherwise be afforded through the State Minimum Salary
20 Schedule included in the annual Education Trust Fund
21 Appropriations Act in force at the time. Additionally, this
22 act may not be construed to allow a local school system to
23 require any employee to involuntarily relinquish any rights or
24 privileges acquired by that employee as a result of attaining
25 tenure or nonprobationary status.

1 (d) The State Department of Education shall finalize
2 all school data and the local school system shall seek
3 approval of the local board of education before final
4 submission to the State Department of Education and the State
5 Board of Education.

6 (e) The final innovation plan, as recommended by the
7 local superintendent of education and approved by the local
8 board of education, shall accompany the formal submission of
9 the local school system to the State Department of Education.

10 (f) The State Board of Education shall promulgate
11 any necessary rules and regulations required to implement this
12 act including, but not limited to, all of the following:

13 (1) The specification of timelines for submission
14 and approval of the innovation plan and school flexibility
15 contract of a local school system.

16 (2) An authorization for the State Department of
17 Education, upon approval by the State Board of Education after
18 periodic review, to revoke a school flexibility contract for
19 noncompliance or nonperformance, or both, by a local school
20 system.

21 (3) An outline of procedures and necessary steps
22 that a local school system shall follow, upon denial of an
23 original submission, to amend and resubmit an innovation plan
24 and school flexibility contract for approval.

25 Section 7. The State Board of Education and the
26 State Department of Education shall ensure equal opportunity

1 for all school systems that apply for programmatic flexibility
2 or budgetary flexibility, or both, as delineated in this act,
3 and in no way shall one local school system be favored over
4 another local school system based upon its size, location,
5 student population, or any other possible discriminatory
6 measure.

7 Section 8. This act shall become effective
8 immediately following its passage and approval by the
9 Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
